Call Process & Update

A congregation's Call Process contains several "mile markers" by which the journey is charted:

- A pastor announces that they are leaving the congregation.
- An interim pastor is identified, merges with congregational life, and begins to develop a sense of the congregation and a familiarity with the parishioners.
- A Mission Exploration Team (MET) is formed and works to engage the congregation in the self-learning and investigation that reveals a thorough understanding of the congregation's history and journey, the present reality of the congregation, where the congregation believes God is calling them, and what kind of pastoral leadership might best partner with them in pursuing that mission. This is the meat and potatoes of the Call Process.
 - * Surveys and Focus Groups have been conducted to gather congregational input on perceived needs, values, and mission.
 - * The MET drafted Christ Our Savior's Ministry Site Profile.
 - * A Town Hall Meeting was held for congregational review of the MSP and prepared for the congregational Town Hall Meeting last December
- <u>COS is in this stage</u> > A Call Committee is formed. COS's Call Committee is Aaron Dietz, Edie Schaffner, Angie Lura, Dave Abresch, Mike Singer, and Brynn Haigh (youth rep). The COS Call Committee has received its orientation and is proceeding with its work. Please hold them in prayer.
- The Church Council receives the Call Committee's pastoral candidate recommendation.
- The congregation votes on the Church Council's recommended pastoral candidate and a call is issued.

Good Tidings in Times of Transition

Ephesians 2:11-14

So then, remember that at one time you Gentiles by birth, called "the uncircumcision" by those who are called "the circumcision" — a physical circumcision made in the flesh by human hands — remember that you were at that time without Christ, being aliens from the commonwealth of Israel, and strangers to

the covenants of promise, having no hope and without God in the world. But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far off have been brought near by the blood of Christ. For he is our peace; in his flesh he has made both groups into one and has broken down the dividing wall, that is, the hostility between us.

One of the very first issues confronting the emerging Christian church was whether Jesus and his gospel were inclusive of people who were not Jewish. Jesus was Jewish and remained Jewish until his death. His disciples were Jewish. Jesus' Jewish roots and observance are what empowered him mightily in his ministry: they allowed him to critique his own tradition. Jesus did not throw the baby out with the bathwater regarding his Jewish formation, he honored it while transcending those elements that were self-serving rather than God serving. All religions benefit from adherents that can do so. It is needed. When religion is only concerned with itself rather than pointing to the larger truth beyond it or when it concerned with itself at a level where there is a human cost, it ceases to be of use. Including Christianity. The argument in the early Church about who Jesus and the gospel were for and who could be a part of the emerging Christian sect might seem odd to us in modern times, but it was a critical issue in the emerging first century church. Thanks to Paul's work, those that did not have Jewish roots were included in the new church.

While that issue might have been resolved in the 1st century, Christianity often seems on the verge of losing the meaning of that teaching: Jesus and his gospel transcend whatever divisions we attempt to erect that create groups of insiders and outsiders. Borrowing Paul's language from the Ephesians text quoted above, Christ is our peace and in him all dividing walls are broken down. There is no "insider" or "outsider," or "us" and "them." All there is, is all of us, in Christ. He is still our peace. All our peace. And that means he is our peace when we attempt to go around this truth by rebuilding tired dividing walls/ hostilities that humans have loved from time immemorial and insist that they are bigger or more powerful than Creator God – dividing walls like nationality, skin color, resident/immigrant, class, sex, gender, wealthy/ impoverished, healthy/ sick, etc. Christ breaks down dividing walls so that we know that it is not possible to be divided in Christ AND in order that we are relieved of the burden of not facing each other. Avoidance solves nothing in life. Christ is the total opposite of that impulse. He does not redeem all creation by avoiding it. He embraces and becomes whatever needs transformation. That is the meaning of incarnation. The symbol for it is the cross.

How will we, like Jesus, know when we should critique our own tradition? Perhaps it will be when we recognize the ways we have come to think that we have something to lose in our buildings and institutional structures and protect them at the expense of what mattered to Jesus: people. Can we acknowledge our fears? Can we, instead of tending them, give them to God? The love and inclusion of the gospel of Jesus Christ is always far ahead of the church. While that may be ever so, may it be the pillar of cloud that leads us by day and the pillar of fire by night that leads us to a promised life in which the hostility between us is broken down.

From the Associate Pastor

The words of the psalmist declare, "Be still and know that I am God." The gospel writers tell us that Jesus often withdrew from the crowds in order to pray. Genesis' opening story of creation describes how even God set aside time to rest and established the importance of Sabbath time for all of creation. Our scriptures remind us again and again that God's rhythm of life calls us into seasons of restful abiding in God's presence followed by seasons of fruitful activity before returning to the holy practices of Sabbath keeping.

I have a friend in ministry who sometimes says folks' push back on this assertion by saying, "But Pastor, doesn't that story in Genesis show that God calls us to activity first, and only after we have completed all our work that we enter into times of rest?" As he shares with them, "What do you imagine God was doing before everything else existed?" The Lord abides, and calls all of creation to share in practices of working from a place of restfulness. In the kingdom of God, we do not need to earn rest – this is yet one more way that God invites us into experiences of grace and abundance.

I spoke with the council last year about making time in 2023 for me to take a three and a half month leave of absence. After the challenges we faced together navigating pandemic practices and staffing changes as a community, I recognized a need within myself to create intentional space for being still with God and attending to the direction of the Spirit for this next chapter of ministry.

A few folks inquired about my plans for this time away. If you're curious, the short list includes: taking naps, reading books and listening to podcasts, spending time with family and friends, journaling, and following where the Holy Spirit piques my curiosity for what God has already been up to in our midst. I will also be holding our congregation in prayer during my time away, and trusting that the Creator who calls us to common mission is doing the heavy lifting of fostering transformation in our community. I look forward to rejoining with all of you in the fall to continue in our practices of being **gathered** in Christ, **fed** by God's Word, and **sent** to serve the world around us.

We had 6 volunteers who helped with our role of clean-up in April. A special thank you to all the helping hands! This month, we do not have a role, but everyone is still wel-




come to come for the community meal at St James at 5:30 p.m. However, please mark your calendars for Thursday, June 22nd as we serve in two roles: setup and cooking.
