Call Process & Update

A congregation's Call Process contains several "mile markers" by which the journey is charted:

- A pastor announces that they are leaving the congregation.
- An interim pastor is identified, merges with congregational life, and begins to develop a sense of the congregation and a familiarity with the parishioners.
- A Mission Exploration Team (MET) is formed and works to engage the congregation in the self-learning and investigation that reveals a thorough understanding of the congregation's history and journey, the present reality of the congregation, where the congregation believes God is calling them, and what kind of pastoral leadership might best partner with them in pursuing that mission. This is the meat and potatoes of the Call Process.
 - Surveys and Focus Groups have been conducted to gathered congregational input on perceived needs, values, and mission.
 - The MET drafts Christ Our Savior's Ministry Site Profile.
 - A Town Hall Meeting his held for congregational review of the MSP and preparing for the congregational Town Hall Meeting December
- <u>COS is in this stage</u> > A Call Committee is formed. COS's Call Committee is Aaron Dietz, Edie Schafner, Angie Lura, Dave Abresch, Mike Singer, and Brynn Haigh (youth rep). *The COS Call Committee has received its orientation and is proceeding with its work. Please hold them in prayer.*
- The Church Council receives the Call Committee's pastoral candidate recommendation.
- The congregation votes on the Church Council's recommended pastoral candidate and a call is issued.

Good Tidings in Times of Transition

I have been put here for the defense of the gospel. Philippians 1:16

In the history of Christianity Paul stands as a monumental figure. Zealous for his Jewish faith, he was a persecutor of the early Christian church until he underwent a conversion that turned him into a witness to the gospel, particularly among the non-Jewish. His work in proclaiming the good news put him at odds with Jewish religious leaders as well as with the Roman government which often led to experiences of imprisonment and punishment. Even amid these profound challenges, Paul only ever sees developments as new opportunities to speak to the good news of Jesus Christ. It is always a good occasion to speak to the good news of Jesus Christ.

Why is this the case? Because every development of life is an opportunity to describe how there is nothing in all of creation that can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus. And as the church we are blessed with the profound gift of being called to speak to that truth in the world. This is the work of the church. There is no circumstance of life that can name us as something unlovable to (or unvalued by) God – not hardship, distress, persecution, famine, nakedness, peril, or sword (cf. Romans 8:35) – and we live in a world that craves this message yet works tirelessly to create categories of insiders and outsiders. How hard it is for us to trust the world God made is big enough for the world God made and that the love of God that made the world is the right sized love for the God who is all in all.

How, in your life, might you connect with Paul's sentiment that, "I have been put here for the defense of the gospel?" What occasions do you see in which the promise of God's unconditional love needs sharing through action and speech? The specifics of how you have needed to hear of God's unconditional love are the path by which you might recognize the scenarios in which your witness to God's love might naturally emerge.

Part of what made the early Christian church scandalous derived from how their experience of the gospel allowed them to trust that the presence of the divine was part of every person and as such every person was deserving of being treated with dignity. This can still be a hallmark of being the church in the 21st century. "I give you a new commandment," says Jesus, "that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another" (cf. John 13:34). This is the gospel that is worth defending. And at Christ Our Savior you have been put here for the defense of the gospel. The need of the world to hear of God's mercy is so great that there are never enough voices to share that message. It is part of your gift that you are planted where you are, a branch connected to the vine who is Jesus Christ (cf. John 15:1-11), to announce good news in the Sussex community.

Like Paul, may you rejoice in any circumstance as an opportunity to proclaim the mercy of Christ for the sake of the world.

They help with handing out bulletins, guiding people up for Communion, and collecting offering. We need at least 2 ushers at each service. We have only a handful of people helping with ushering. This is a good time for you to step up to serve as an usher.
